Getting Your Driver’s License Converted

For all JETs in possession of an International Driver’s Permit for driving here in Japan, it is important to remember that it is only valid for one year after issuance. Following this it is necessary for you to convert to a Japanese driver’s license if you wish to continue driving in Japan.

All JETs are required to take a driving theory test in order to convert their license but US and South African JETs must also undergo a practical driving test which is held at an examination centre in Mitahora, Gifu City.
